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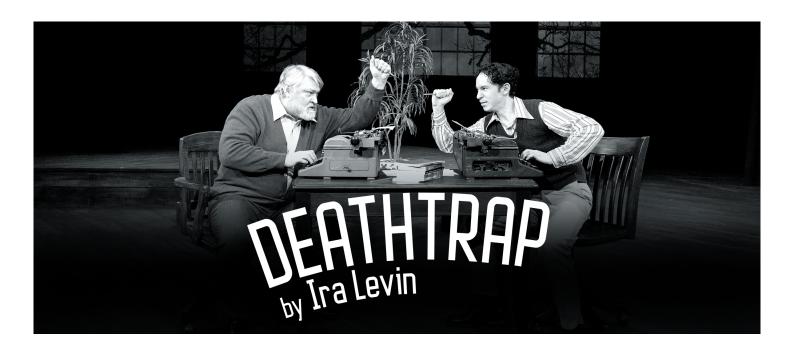

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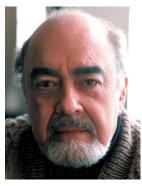


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# **ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT**



### Ira Levin - Playwright

Born in the Bronx, New York in 1929, Ira Levin attended the Horace Mann School and (after a two-year stint at Iowa's Drake University) New York University. While at NYU, a CBS television writing contest got him his first professional credit, and an agent – whereupon he began writing half-hour fanta-

sy/suspense television fare during TV's "golden age."

Fresh out of college, Levin wrote the Edgar Award-winning suspense classic *A Kiss Before Dying*. Just before its publication, he was drafted into the U.S. Army, where – while not occupied in the writing of standard-issue training films – he scripted two hourlong teleplays, *Notebook Warrior* and *No Time For Sergeants*. Immediately out of the army, he made his Broadway debut, with his full-length stage treatment of Sergeants.

Levin spent the next 14 years crafting original full-length stage plays, beginning with his psychological drama *Interlock* (1958), his urbane comedy *Critic's Choice* (1960), his searing military drama *General See-*

ger (1962) and his one musical, *Drat! The Cat!* (1965) – which yielded the Barbra Streisand standard "He Touched Me".

Levin returned to novel writing, penning 1967's epochal Rosemary's Baby – credited with ushering in the era of modern horror. His 1972 The Stepford Wives would take its place in the collective psyche, as both a cultural reference point, and a touchstone of social and domestic fiction. Levin would spend the remainder of his 50+ year career alternating between novels and plays.

Levin crafted one of the most enduring works of contemporary theater – 1978's comedy-thriller *Deathtrap* – the fifth-longest running play in Broadway history. Levin received a 1978 "Best Play" Tony Award nomination for *Deathtrap*

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If you know Angel Street, or Dial M for Murder, or Sleuth, or Witness for the Prosecution, you know the source material that informed this work by Ira Levin. A master of the genre, Levin also gave us Rosemary's Baby and The Stepford Wives, but Deathtrap was his most successful stage work. The Broadway production ran for 1,793 performances (four years), and garnered actor Marian Seldes (Myra Bruhl) with a Guiness Book of World Records mention for "most durable actress" because she performed in every single one.

As a director, I'm continually drawn to stories and characters that aren't what they seem at first. Characters that keep secrets always have the most exciting stories to tell. Yet much of the work we know in the theatre is centered around character - how do we feel about what this character is going through? How does the struggle impact and inform us? The thriller and mystery genre is different. This work is focused on a lost art form: plot. It's what happens that's important, or more properly stated: what is going to happen? The best writers will keep you guessing, and Ira Levin is always many, many steps ahead.

But what makes *Deathtrap* fun, aside from all the surprises, is its self awareness. Sidney Bruhl, constantly in search of the one-set five-character money-maker, hits the jackpot when such a script, "Deathtrap", arrives in his mail. The metatheatricality doesn't stop there, as the characters struggle to write the story they're telling (i.e. Clifford's line in Act Two, "Act Two is liable to be a letdown").

It's almost absurd to try and write anything about a play like this, since anything specific is giving the game away. If you've seen the play (or the movie), you can do your partner a favor and just sit back, quietly. If you don't know though: lucky you. Please bring your seat back and tray table to their upright position, fasten your seatbelt, and enjoy the ride. Remember also that your nearest exit may be behind you.

### Aaron Lamb (he/him) - Director

Aaron is the Producing Artistic Director of Harlequin Productions. As Artistic Director, he has directed or music directed Every Brilliant Thing, Falsettos, Hundred Days, A Christmas Carol (2021, 2022, 2023), This Flat Earth, Hedwig and the Angry Inch, The Highest Tide, Sherlock Holmes and the Case of the Christmas Carol, Man of La Mancha, A Doll's House, Love and Information, and The 1940s Radio Hour. In eleven seasons as an actor and guest director with Harlequin he also directed I Am My Own Wife, Three Days of Rain, Ruthless!, August: Osage County, Hedda Gabler, Time Stands Still, Middletown, and Five Women Wearing the Same Dress. As an actor, he most recently appeared in the 2021-2022 season, as Jacob Marley in A Christmas Carol. Lamb has worked in Seattle for Village Theatre, Taproot Theatre, Book-It Repertory Theatre, and Seattle Shakespeare Company, and has worked regionally throughout the country. He holds an MFA in Acting from California State University, Fullerton, a BA from Washington State University, and is a member of the Actor's Equity Association.

### Candace James (she/her)

- Fight and Intimacy Director

For the past fifteen years, Candace has directed and provided fight choreography throughout the Northwest, the Southeast, and internationally in Florence, Italy. Candace is also a professional improv artist, an SAFD trained combatant, and a playwright. In addition to her freelance work, Candace teaches at Green River College and is the head theatrical director for Children's Dance Theatre. This is Candace's first show with Harlequin Productions. She credits her husband and 8-year-old twin daughters with helping her master the art of chaos coordination.

### Gerald B. Browning (he/him)

- Scenic Design/Scenic Charge Artist

Gerald has designed sets for over fifty productions, including locally at Theatre22, Centerstage, and Seattle Public Theatre. Regionally, he's designed for such companies as DC's Imagination Stage, Maine's the Theatre at Monmouth, and Virginia's Wayside Theatre, where he was the Resident Scenic Designer. He's also served as Properties Designer for sixteen Harlequin Productions, most recently designing Building Madness and A Christmas Carol (2022). At Harlequin, he has appeared in *Until the Flood*, *The Highest* Tide, Love and Information, The 1940's Radio Hour, and The Love List. Local and regional acting credits: Seattle Shakespeare Company, Taproot Theatre, SecondStory Rep, Mt. Baker Theatre, Theater at Monmouth (ME), Seaside Repertory Theatre (FL), DC's Keegan Theatre (Helen Hayes Award nomination), the Smithsonian, and Kennedy Center. Gerald is also a director, dialect coach, and writer. He currently has two screenplays in development with an Academy Award-winning producer. Gerald holds a Master's Degree (Directing) from the Chicago College of the Performing Arts at Roosevelt University.

Sound is all around us, yet nearly always invisible. It contributes to a sense of place, sets mood, and provides valuable cues about the world we inhabit. From a 1993 puppet show adaptation of King Lear in the Star Wars universe, through over a hundred and thirty other productions, Keith has had the pleasure of getting to work with the exceptional designers, actors, and directors here at Harlequin for seventeen seasons, as well as sixteen seasons at Saint Martin's University. You also may have seen their work in Ripley's "Believe It Or Not." Recent and favorite Sound Designer credits here include Hundred Days, Fun Home. Hedwig and the Angry Inch, Murder for Two, pieces throughout the 2021 Fall Repertory Season, August: Osage County, and The Art of Racing in the Rain.

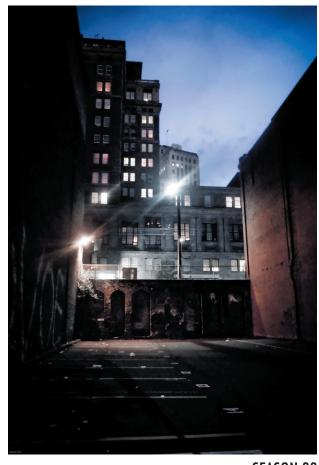
# Sharon Styer - The Night Watchman

Soon after moving to Tacoma in 2006, I had the great good fortune of running the Photo Safari program for the City of Tacoma. Armed with the power of the City I could gain access to any location that i wanted to lead a group of photographers on a photo shoot. At that time, there were a lot of broken dreams in Tacoma, which showed up as abandoned buildings. Except for graffiti artists, no one had been inside some of the buildings for years. These intriguing places became my destinations. Unlocking doors to empty dusty rooms with no electricity made even the light through gritty windows feel abandoned. These places became my photographic theme which I called The Night Watchman.

I added to my collection of abandonment by driving around Tacoma in the evenings searching out eerie lights down empty streets and alleyways. I found solace in these dark, beautiful places.

In 2011, I received the Tacoma Artist Initiative grant (TAIP) which lead to a solo show of The Night Watchman at Fulcrum Gallery in Tacoma. I printed the images on aluminum. On each image I attached two mini lights as if they were street lights reflecting down on the images. The gallery was dark - no lights were on other than these small lights on the photos.

In honor of *Deathtrap* now playing at Harlequin, I present once again, The Night Watchman. I have added a few images to this show. A few photos of Tacoma's Gritty City Sirens, a burlesque group. And, of course, a few of my collages that tip into this dark theme.



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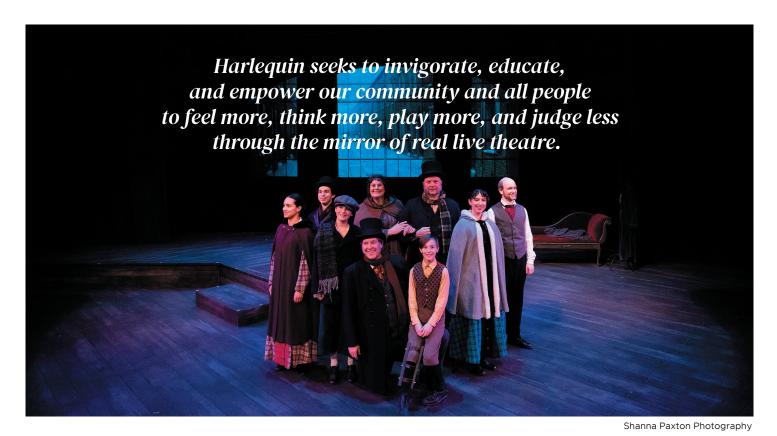

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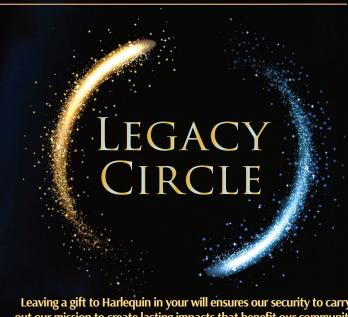
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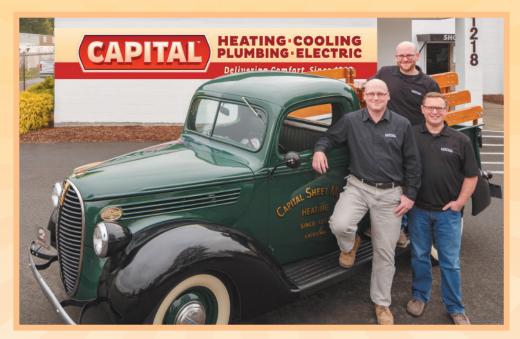
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
