

Season 2026: "Home/Land"

It's becoming more difficult to be an artist in America.

You probably think I'm talking about funding cuts. Or politics. I'm not. Artists tell stories, and in order to tell stories, we need two things: a voice, and a listener. I have had the privilege of making art in many of our 50 states, but I am increasingly asking myself: how do I connect when every place feels more and more like a battleground?

We've lost something in America. In our swipe-left, swipe-right mania, we attempt to bucket every issue, experience, and interaction into "with" or "against" categories. And we find that it's more difficult to "like" or "dislike" things in the 3-D world without actually having to engage with them. So we judge. And we disengage.

We fight. We wake up fighting. We go to sleep fighting. We fight with friends, with family, with strangers. We fight over what America means, and who gets to define it. We fight over whose version of American "values" is real. We fight over who belongs and who doesn't. We fight over history, and which stories we tell, and which we erase. We fight over the future, and what we will leave our children, and the responsibility we will take for it. We fight over basic facts. We fight over reality.

These constant skirmishes are all about ownership. We've turned our shared space, our land, into territory. Every place, every idea, is now something to be claimed, defended, conquered, and owned. But home isn't territory. Home is where you belong, where you're accepted as you are.

The question I'm asking of all of us for 2026: how do we transform this land into a home big enough for everyone? How do we listen to voices that challenge our assumptions and find that our capacity to hold complexity - to sit with disagreement - is actually our greatest strength? How can we find pride in where we live? How can we be proud of who we are?

For this season of plays, we're exploring many stories from across the American experience. We'll hear stories from those who knew this land first. We'll explore how economic forces displace working-class people. And we'll explore how race exacerbates that divide. We'll introduce the idea of environmental legacy, and we'll question the generational responsibility for the land we leave behind. We'll see how being underestimated can become the ultimate advantage. We'll look at what it means to be an outsider, and how quickly that can change. We'll celebrate the beauty of ordinary life.

And we will have so much fun! We'll take our shoes off and romp through Central Park, exploring one of the most famous comedies in the theatrical canon, by one of the most celebrated American playwrights. We'll travel to Sun Studios in Memphis in 1956 to view one of the most iconic recording sessions in American history. We'll journey to the breathtaking landscapes of Alaska through the eyes of a master storyteller. We'll explore one of the most iconic dramas in the American canon, and we'll ask the question: what does this teach us about who we choose to include? And who we choose to erase? We'll give you a thriller that will make you scream, and a farce that will make you ache with laughter.

For thirty-five years, we've been gathering in this space, finding common ground through shared stories. In a world that feels increasingly divided, that tradition feels more important than ever. Come home with us.

I can't wait to see you in the theatre.

WAIT UNTIL DARK

By Frederick Knott Adapted by Jeffrey Hatcher Directed by Aaron Lamb

She can't see them-but she knows they're there. In this white-knuckle thriller, Susan Hendrix, newly blind, seems an easy mark when three ruthless criminals invade her Greenwich Village apartment. Forty-seven years after its 1966 premiere, Jeffrey Hatcher has adapted Frederick Knott's (Dial 'M' for Murder) original script with crackling, claustrophobic, and calculated efficiency. When the lights go out, survival comes down to nerve, instinct, and the element of surprise. As the climax builds, Susan discovers that her blindness just might be the key to her escape, but she and her tormentors must wait until dark to play out this classic thriller's chilling conclusion.

When a painfully shy Englishman lands at a rustic Georgia lodge, his fear of small talk inspires a harmless fib: he doesn't speak English! But as locals pour out secrets, Charlie becomes the perfect confidant—and whispers of a secret society stir old resentments beneath the lodge's pastoral calm. As laughter turns to high stakes, Charlie must summon unexpected courage—and maybe foil a sinister plot.

Larry Shue's *The Foreigner* proves how easily secrets and prejudices can tip a friendly gathering into something far more dangerous. When overheard asides set off chaos, Charlie's accidental silence becomes a mirror: what might we learn if we actually listened? In the spirit of screwball mayhem meets rustic intrigue, each new confession detonates laugh-out-loud chaos. Quiet no more—Charlie's about to speak volumes.



As Paul's pragmatism clashes with Corie's spontaneity, only a barefoot sprint through Washington Square can save their marriage.

Smart, snappy, and full of heart,
Tony Award-winning Barefoot in
the Park opened on Broadway
in 1963 and ran for 1,530
performances, becoming Neil
Simon's first smash hit and one of
the ten longest-running plays in
Broadway history. Today, Simon's
landmark comedy remains an
American stage treasure, its
sparkling wit and heartfelt charm
as irresistible as ever.

What begins as a pact of loyalty slowly fractures under the weight of adult consequences.

Pulitzer Prize winner Martyna Majok's Sanctuary City asks the question: In a nation built on the promise of opportunity, how do we determine who benefits? Where once belonging was measured by front-porch waves and neighborhood gatherings, today it hinges on paperwork and the threat of separation - or possibly far worse.


